California State Parks Awards \$548.3 Million in Grants to Create Local New Parks Across California as Part of Newsom Administration's "Outdoors for All" Initiative. California State Parks today announced \$548.3 million in grant funding to deliver new parks to more than 100 communities and advance the Newsom Administration's "Outdoors for All" initiative to enable all Californians, regardless of zip code or income, to access parks and open space. Nonpoint Source Pollution (NPS) Control Program. The NPS Program administers grant money it receives from United States Environmental Protection Agency through Section 319(h) of the Federal Clean Water Act and from the state Timber Regulation and Forest Restoration Fund. These grant funds can be used to implement projects or programs that will help to reduce NPS pollution. Projects that qualify for funding must be conducted within the state's NPS priority watersheds. State Coastal Conservancy: Wildfire Resilience Program Request for Proposals. The Coastal Conservancy is pleased to announce its Wildfire Resilience Program Request for Proposals. The Wildfire Resilience Program supports local partners to develop and implement projects that improve ecological health of natural lands and reduce the risk of catastrophic fire. Pre-proposals are due by 5pm on January 14, 2022 for project approved by May 2022. The Program will host a webinar on December 16th at 1:00pm to provide an overview of this funding proposal and answer questions. <u>Register Here</u>.

NOAA is recruiting candidates for the 2022 <u>Coastal Management</u> and <u>Digital Coast Fellowship</u> Program. This program's mission is to provide on-the-job education and training opportunities in coastal resource management and policy for postgraduate students and to provide project assistance to state coastal zone management agencies and other key NOAA partners. The twelve fellowship positions start in August 2022 and are available with the California Coastal Commission, California Coastal Conservancy, and in other coastal programs in various states. Eligibility requirements, descriptions of the projects, and guidance on how to apply can be found <u>here</u>. Application packages must be submitted to the Sea Grant office in the state where you received your degree by **Friday, January 21, 2022**.

The <u>Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration grant program</u> seeks to develop community capacity to sustain local natural resources for future generations by providing modest financial assistance to diverse local partnerships focused on improving water quality, watersheds and the species and habitats they support. <u>RFP here</u> & full proposals are due **January 25, 2022 by 8:59 PM**.

State Coastal Conservancy Coastal Stories Grant Program. SCC seeks to fund projects that plan, develop, and implement storytelling installations or materials (such as murals, signage, monuments, or guides) that represent communities and voices that may include but are not limited to BIPOC people, people with disabilities, immigrant communities, low-income communities, and other historically excluded communities. They encourage proposals for community-led projects that show strong community and landowner partnerships and use creative forms of historical, ecological, and cultural storytelling. NFWF emergency coastal resilience RFP for Santa Cruz and Monterey County. This funding comes directly from the Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act, (PL 117-43) to support projects that increase the resilience of wildlife habitat and coastal communities impacted by hurricanes and wildfires in 2020 and 2021. Due Thursday, February 3, 2022 at 8:59pm.

Electrification and innovation grant program. Central Coast Community Energy (CCCE) announced the launch of its Electrification and Innovation Grant Program. Totaling \$1 million in available funds, this second iteration of grants focused on community education about electrification and its benefits has been expanded to include two new focus areas: workforce training and development as well as a separate track for cities and counties served by CCCE, known as CCCE member agencies.
